6. About Guests invited to 2012 IASIL Japan Conference

Dr. Sinéad Morrissey was born on 24 April 1972 in Portadown, County Armagh, Northern Ireland. She has published four collections of poetry: *There Was Fire in Vancouver* (1996); *Between Here and There* (2002); *The State of the Prisons* (2005); and *Through the Square Window* (2009). Three of these collections have been shortlisted for the T. S. Eliot Prize. She was the 2002 Poetry International Writer in Residence at the Royal Festival Hall and is currently Lecturer at the Seamus Heaney Centre for Poetry, Queen's University, Belfast. Having lived and worked in Japan and New Zealand, she now lives in Northern Ireland. She was selected by the British Council to take part in the Writers' Train Project in China in 2003. In 2007 she was awarded a Lannan Literary Fellowship. Dr. Morrissey was the winner of the UK National Poetry Competition of the same year, and in 2010, *Through The Square Window* was shortlisted for the Forward Poetry Prize (Best Poetry Collection of the Year).

Dr. Irene de Angelis holds a Research Fellowship in English Literature at the University of Turin, Italy. With Joseph Woods she is co-editor of *Our Shared Japan: An Anthology of Contemporary Irish Poetry* (2007), and has published numerous articles on contemporary Irish poetry. Her most recent work, *The Japanese Effect in Contemporary Irish Poetry* (2012) provides a stimulating, original and lively analysis of the Irish-Japanese literary connection from the early 1960s to 2006. Drawing on unpublished new sources, Dr. De Angelis includes poets from a broad range of cultural backgrounds with richly varied styles: Seamus Heaney, Derek Mahon, Ciaran Carson and Paul Muldoon, together with younger poets such as Sinéad Morrissey and Joseph Woods.
