R. F. Foster is Carroll Professor of Irish History at the University of Oxford and a Fellow of Hertford College, Oxford. He is widely known as the author of the authorized biography of W. B. Yeats, *W.B. Yeats: A Life I. The Apprentice Mage* (1997); *II. The Arch-Poet* (2003). His most recent book is *Vivid Faces: The Revolutionary Generation in Ireland, 1890-1923* (2014).

Moya Cannon was born in Co. Donegal, spent most of her adult life in Galway and now lives in Dublin. She is a winner of the Brendan Behan Award and the O Shaughnessy Award. Her previous collections of poems are *Oar* (1990), *The Parchment Boat* (1997), *Carrying the Songs* (2007) and *Hands* (2011), which was nominated for the Irish Times / Poetry Now Award.

6. Obituary

In Memory of Daniel Albright (1945-2015)

We recently received the sad news that Dr. Daniel Albright, Professor of Harvard University passed away on January 3, 2015. He continually stimulated our intellect with such ground breaking works as *Quantum Poetics: Yeats, Pound, Eliot, and the Science of Modernism*, and his marvelous insights resulting from a deep interest in literature and music exemplified in *Modernism and Music: An Anthology of Sources*. His interest in music integrated perfectly with his interest in painting which blossomed into his most recent publication, *Panaesthetics: On the Unity and Diversity of the Arts*. Every reader of Yeats' poems has a tremendous appreciation for his volume on 'Complete Yeats Poems' accompanied by his original detailed commentary.

In 2005, Dr. Albright visited Japan as a guest scholar of Japan Yeats Society as well as IASIL Japan. As Secretary of IASIL Japan and also an organizer of a symposium at the Yeats Society Conference on "Yeats, Beckett and Noh" to which he was a commentator, I got in touch with him before and during the conference and was quite touched with his tender, warm, and very kind personality. At Musashino University where our annual conference was held, he gave a lecture, "The River that Flows from Japan to England: *Curfew River*," introduced by Professor Hiroyuki Yamasaki who was his long time friend. This lecture revealed his deep understanding of Japanese Noh, particularly *Sumidagawa* and Western music, specifically, Benjamin Britten's opera. I cannot forget his impressions on the performance of *Sumidagawa* which I also enjoyed together with him, with Umewaka Rokuro (present Gensho) as *shite* just before the conference at Kyoto Kanze Kaikan as well as how happily he laughed at a series of Kyogen plays performed in Kyoto a few days before that. From a very personal perspective, he also radiated a very sincere personality when he gave a lecture "W. B. Yeats and Music" to my students at Shiga University. We will sorely miss his academic insights and his very warm, friendly smile.
